


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Vegetation Impacts

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- Soil compaction
- Soil erosion

- Universal Garbage Can




Social Impacts

- Noise












Cultural and Historic Impacts

Public Perception



 Common perceptions by Federal land management agencies about BSA units on federal land:

- Scouts out of control
- Too much noise
- Group sizes too big
- Camping skills badly out of date
- Inappropriate play damages the backcountry
- Don't keep appointments to do service work
- Completely soak up popular campsites or shelters
- Unskilled campers using areas that call for expert skills
- Using inappropriate areas (hi-use, fragile) to train new campers



- Travel responsibly
 - Stay on designated roads, trails and areas.
 - Cross streams only at designated fords
- Respect the rights of others
 - Yield the right of way to those passing you
- Educate yourself
 - Use maps and regulations from public agencies
- Avoid sensitive areas
 - Stay on designated routes, avoid meadows & wetlands
- Do your part
 - Model appropriate behavior, dispose of trash responsibly
 - Minimize the use of fires
 - Repair degraded areas

 The Land Ethic is offered by Aldo Leopold in 1949 in A Sand County Almanac.

 He reflected on the interaction with man and the land. "The Land Ethic simply enlarges the boundaries of the new community which includes soils, waters, plants and animals, or collectively referred to as, the LAND."



The Land Ethic

CETOOR ETHICS & CONSERVE

- The Land Ethic grows strongest when we have:
 - Experienced the LAND
 - Grown to love and respect it
 - Have labored to enhance or restore it
 - As Leopold would have put it, when we have practiced "conservation" defined as restoring the capacity of the Land for self-renewal.


"A thing is right when it tends to preserve the integrity, stability, and beauty of the biotic community. It is wrong when it tends otherwise."

Distinguished Conservation Service Award (DCSA)

- Replaced the Hornaday Medal program in 2021
- Youth Award
 - Distinguished Conservation Service Award
- Adult Award
 - Distinguished Conservationist
- Organization Award
 - DCSA Certificate





Distinguished Conservation Service Award (DCSA)

- DCSA Youth
- Available to Scouts BSA, Venturing, & Sea Scouts
- Numerous requirements including 2 high level conservation projects that have been approved by your Council Conservation Committee

- Distinguished Conservationist (Adult)
- Available to any adult who has contributed at least 20 years of conservation based work at the regional, national, or international level.



DCSA

- Recognition for those who earn this award includes a knot and a medal.
- Youth medal can be pinned to shirt.
- Adult medal on a ribbon to be worn around the neck.



Mound Fire







Mound Fire



- Innovative method of building a Leave No Trace fire
- Items needed
 - A garden trowel
 - Large stuff sack
 - A ground cloth/tarp


- Lay the tarp out
- Turn the stuff sack inside out
- Fill with mineral soil
- Spread the soil into a mound 4 to 6 inches high
- Flatten the top and build your fire



Ceremonial Pan Fire

- The use of fire as a visual aid doesn't mean you need to leave a trace.
- We can do both!












- The OA should be setting the example in Outdoor Ethics and Environmental Stewardship
- OA Members should be Outdoor Ethics Guides.
- The OA should bring the Outdoor Ethics message and training to our units, our summer camps and practiced wherever we camp.







- Scouting principles promote responsible use of natural and human resources such as:
 - forests
 - water
 - land
 - outdoor ethics
 - good stewardship of BSA lands for today and tomorrow

We have an obligation to plan for the future when it comes to our properties.

 A good forest management plan includes not only taking care of the forest but also training those who are going to help maintain it.








 - Roundtables, camporees, etc.




