# **BEFORE NESA**

#### Knights of Dunamis (KD)

- Founded as an independent organization in San Francisco on April 19, 1925 by Scout Executive Raymond O. Hanson
- The KD had their own rank of Knights Eagle Award
- BSA felt the KD took the most important leadership out of the local units.
- In 1972, the KD was merged into the BSA.
- The National Eagle Scout Association (NESA) succeeded the KD and became an official fraternal organization within the BSA.



# **SCHOLARSHIPS**

- Awarded \$12+ Million in Scholarship to over 3,200 Eagles
- 2023 Scholarships
  - \$516,000 total
  - 69 recipients
- Scholarships are awarded to Eagle Scouts who have shown active participation in school, Scouting activities, and community service, and who demonstrate they understand the fundamentals of service to community, service to Scouting and their character. They should also demonstrate that, if they have a financial need, what distinguishes their financial need from others.
- Window to apply is open annually from December 1<sup>st</sup> to January 31<sup>st</sup>

#### GLENN AND MELINDA ADAMS NATIONAL EAGLE SCOUT SERVICE PROJECT OF THE YEAR AWARD



- Recognizes valuable service of an exceptional nature by an Eagle Scout candidate to a religious institution, school, community or other entity through completion of an Eagle Scout project.
- National winner receives \$3,500
- Territory winners receives \$300



**Distinguished Eagle Scout Award -**The Distinguished Eagle Scout Award (DESA) was established in 1969 by the National Eagle Scout Association to recognize Eagle Scouts who achieve extraordinary national-level recognition, fame, or eminence within their professional service to the nation and have a strong record of voluntary service to their community.




The National Eagle Scout Association established the NESA Outstanding Eagle Scout Award (NOESA) to commemorate the Boy Scouts of America's 100th Anniversary in 2010. Since its inception, the award has become an important recognition among Eagle Scouts, recognizing their distinction, with less stringent\* requirements required for the prestigious **Distinguished Eagle Scout** Award (DESA).

The purpose of the **NESA Distinguished Service** Award is to recognize those who have given a lifetime of extraordinary leadership and service nationally to NESA, resulting in a significant impact on a national or territorial level. It is awarded for dedicated service over a sustained period of years to NESA, promotion of Eagle Scouting, staying active or returning to Scouting, and promoting/helping young people earning the rank of Eagle Scout. Awards are limited in number and are normally presented during BSA's Annual National Meeting.



**NESA Silver Wreath Award -** In the mid-1970s, the National Eagle Scout Association (NESA) committee established the NESA Silver Wreath Award for service to NESA. Local Councils with active NESA Committees may recognize individual leadership and/or service by committee members via the Silver Wreath Award. Recipients must be a member in good standing of NESA for at least two years. Each Council NESA Committee may nominate two awards per calendar year.



Fellowship in the NESA Legacy Society is open to any currently registered youth or adult Scouter who has first been recognized as a James E. West Fellow, whether or not they are Eagle Scouts or members of NESA.

All contributions should be in addition to regular support of an individual's local Council fundraising programs.
