# 1. Defining Officers Positions and Obligations



## So What Is a Lodge Officer?

"Lodge Executive Committee typically consists of one or more vice chiefs, a secretary, and a treasurer, as well as chapter and/or service area chiefs and operating committee chairmen who are responsible for various aspects of the lodge's program." - Order of the Arrow




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## ORDER OF THE ARROW

## LEC Organization

Chain of command



- Vice Chief positions and their responsibilities are determined on a lodge-to-lodge basis
- Not mentioned is the use of Chapter Chiefs, especially in large lodges

#### Adult Roles

- As a youth-run youth-led organization, who makes decisions?
- Adult leadership still plays a pivotal role in the Order of the Arrow
- Youth can (and should) go to adult leadership for mentoring and help when needed
- You can't do everything on your own

#### Making Tough Choices

#### Reaching Out

Don't be afraid to reach out to your lodge leadership (Officers, Chairs, or even advisors)

## Finding a Committee

The best starting step to becoming an officer is often to serve as a committee chair

These positions are less intensive and are great for gauging your interest

- Culinary

Don't be afraid to reach out to lodge leadership to express your interest in holding a position of responsibility




### Keep Pushing
