Brief Overview of Cub Scouts

- Started in the 1930's, Cub Scouts is for youth who are in the Kindergarten through fifth grades.
- Lions (Kindergarten), Tigers (first-graders), Wolves (second-graders), Bears (third-graders), and Webelos (fourth-graders) and Arrow of Light (fifth-graders) meet twice a month in Dens.
- Arrow of Light is now specifically to get youth ready for Scouts BSA.
- A Pack is a group of Dens and usually meets monthly.



Helping Qur Siblings in Blue



Focuses on implementing the OA's NEW Vision "To be why Scouts want to stay in Scouting" and its emphasis on an active commitment to Arrow of Light to Scouts BSA transition and supporting age-appropriate Cub Scout outdoor programs.

Mentoring- Den Chief

A Scout BSA member who assists a Cub or Webelos Scout Den . . .

- Assistant to the Den's leadership
- Attends Den Chief training
- Help with the Den meetings, events, Webelos and Arrow of Light Den overnight campout.

The Den Chief is a mentor, friend, Elangomat, role model and guide for the Den helping prepare the Cub Scout for a successful transition into Scouts BSA.

Membership Recruitment & Retention

Cub Scout Membership has gone down 73% in the past 23 years from 2,114,420 (2000) to 574,365 (2023).







Lodge Performance Measurement Program

- •Membership Impact: Experience positive growth in youth membership over the previous year.
 - 2023 PMP Requirement 3
 95 percent of all Scouts BSA members were Cub Scouts. Loss of Cubs=Scouts=Arrowmen
- •Council Support: Contributions to the Council (cash, materials, or both) and Measurable Service to the Council
 - 2023 PMP Requirement 13



Membership Recruitment & Retention

- •Help with membership/recruiting events by being a uniformed presence running games and demos for prospective Cub Scouts while parents learn.
- Mentoring New Units.
- Help at other council Cub Scout recruitment and retention activities.



Cub Scout Outdoor Programs

 Keep in mind the differences between the development and skill levels of Cub Scouts and Scouts BSA.





•The Cub Scout outdoor program has age-appropriate activities and guidelines. *Guide to Safe Scouting*.

Cub Scout Outdoor Programs

Cub Scouts are not small Scouts BSA members.

Keep it Age Appropriate!

- Promote, run, support and serve as staff at Cub Scout Outdoor Events, Camps, activities and help with promotion of these events.
- Where to Go Camping Guide for Cub Scouts.
- •Help with Training- Trained leaders provide a Quality Program.

Webelos and Arrow of Light At A Glance 2024-2025 Update

•Webelos will only be for 4th grade Cub Scouts and Arrow of Light will no longer be associated with Webelos. 4th grade Cub Scouts are referred to as Webelos and may NOT start working on Arrow of Light until they have completed the 4th grade. Webelos wear the blue Cub Scout uniform with the Webelos neckerchief, neckerchief slide, Webelos hat, blue Cub Scout bottoms, blue Cub Scout belt, and Cub Scout socks. They will have their own Webelos handbook.

•Arrow of Light will only be for 5th grade Cub Scouts and is no longer associated with Webelos. 5th grade Cub Scouts are referred to as Arrow of Light Scouts and are introduced to the patrol method. Arrow of Light Scouts wear the Scouts BSA uniform with blue shoulder loops on their epaulets. Arrow of Light Scouts have a requirement for the Bobcat Adventure to visit a Scouts BSA Troop making the timeline of a Troop visit in the early fall at the beginning of the Cub Scout program year. The Arrow of Light badge of rank and required Adventures are designed to prepare Arrow of Light Scouts to join Scouts BSA between January and March. Arrow of Lights will have a separate handbook.



Arrow of Light – Scouts BSA Transition

- Serve as Den Chiefs.
- Perform Webelos Crossover Ceremonies.
- Scouts visiting Packs to explain a Troop.
- Host a Pack. Be visible as Arrowmen.
- •OA troop representatives could become liaisons to the feeder packs.
- •Nationally, about one out of two Webelos makes the transition to Scouts BSA (at or under 50% since 2009).

Official Order of the Arrow Webelos to Scouts BSA and Arrow of Light Ceremonies

•The Cub Scout ceremonies were developed to provide lodges the ability to assist Cub Scout Packs in conducting appropriate ceremonies marking the transition from a Cub Scout earning their Arrow of Light badge and transitioning to the Scouts BSA program. These are nationally approved ceremonies that are to be performed by Scouts wearing the Scout uniform. These ceremonies may be freely used by any Scouts BSA troop or representative, district or council. If an Order of the Arrow lodge, chapter, or ceremony team is invited to perform, these ceremonies are the only ones authorized to be used.

The Order's Involvement With Cub Scouts



Lodge Organization

- •Lodge may appoint a Cub Scout Chairman. A position under the lodge (chapter) program element of the organization, would communicate with the Chapter/Lodge and District/Council personnel on a regular basis.
- •The Lodge may also sponsor awards for Cub Scouts at Camp and for those Arrowmen/Chapters which host Cub Scout activities.
- Invite Cub Scouts to OA fun events.
- •Works closely with the ceremonies team, scheduling and arranging Arrow of Light cross-over ceremonies. The Cub Scout Involvement Chairman support Council sponsored program events for Cub Scout Packs.

How can your Lodge help Cubs?

- •What else?




"Before They Wore the Sash . . . They Wore the Blue"

- Quickly recognizable marketing campaign to be used in OA media.
- •Emphasizes the fact that most OA members were Cub Scouts (since 2019 about 60% of Scouts BSA were previously Cub Scouts).
- Easily replicated at the local level.
- •Clearly communicates role the OA should play in Retention, Cub Scout Outdoor Programs and Webelos to Scout Transition.










Before She Wore the Sash... Her Son Wore the Blue
