Session Description

Seek the Vision at the 2024 National Order of the Arrow Conference is designed to assist ceremonialists and those who aspire to be ceremonialists, with provide you with some techniques and ideas which will help each of you develop your own interpretation of the principal. While this session will cover some of the specific traits personified by Allowat Sakima, much of the general information is applicable to any principal a ceremonialist personifies. It is not designed to teach you the one quintessential way of portraying a principal, since that does not exist. Once a ceremonialist reaches that level of truly embodying the principal, they will be delivering a powerful portrayal that inspires candidates and furthers the aims and purpose of the OA.

Learning Outcomes

Outcome I: Through this session, you will:

- **Explain** specific techniques that participants can use when preparing to become a principal, including finding the objectives and actions and placing the focus on the candidates they are speaking to.
- **Demonstrate** by exposing the participants a process of rehearsal that can be used when preparing to conduct the ceremonies in order to create a powerful experience that they have connected to themselves.
- **Guide** by encouraging them to dig deeper into the text to understand the meaning of the message they must effectively communicate to the candidates, and conduct an in-depth analysis of each the principal, and their motivation.
- **Enable** participants to tap into their own creativity. Provide participants with hands-on feedback on their portrayal by working with them directly.

Outcome 2:

Ceremonialists have a unique and distinct honor of providing the first exposure of the Order of the Arrow's customs and traditions to the candidates during the pre-Ordeal ceremony and help to influence their destiny as Arrowmen. Encourage participants to listen with an open mind as they may learn perspectives that they have not encountered before.

Outcome 3:

The course is divided into two portions. During the narrative portion the session will cover some important concepts and hopefully get participants thinking about ceremonies in a different way. Encourage participants to take notes and ask questions. take notes and ask questions. However, as this is designed as a workshop, try and move quickly through this first portion so you can get to the more "hands-on" part of the course. The workshop portion is where participants will learn how to put the theories and ideas from the narrative portion into practice. Participants will have the opportunity to come up and work on a portion of the pre-Ordeal Ceremony. Invite some feedback, but it won't be an instruction, but rather suggestions on how they can improve their ceremonies. Encourage participation in the workshop even if they have never stepped foot in the ring in front of candidates.

Theme Connection: Seek New Heights

The theme of the 2024 NOAC is Seek New Heights, emphasizing the drive for excellence that characterizes the OA and our daily lives. As the title of this session suggests, your goal is to seek the

higher vision in your portrayal of a principal and therefore improve the overall candidate experience. You will need your presentation on a laptop or electronic device to display the PPT slide deck. Connectivity will likely be HDMI, and trainers should be prepared with any adapters they might need.

Session Preparation Steps

Seek the Vision is the result of the accumulation of over 30 years of ceremonies training and evaluations experience. Much of the information within has been presented before in various iterations. It has been reformatted as a workshop and expanded for the 2024 NOAC. The course is designed to provide a balance of lecture by the trainer and practical experience, in order for participants to give and receive direct feedback on various performance styles. It is recommended that the trainer should balance their engagement of the slide deck with the practical portion and to encourage active participation in the workshop.

As the course includes both a lecture and practical portion, as the instructor, you need to present the information in a way that covers the content, but allows the participants to take an active role in the discussion. Be mindful that it is the instructor's job to guide and set limits on the conversation. Trainers are encouraged to invite questions or comments, but take a few and then move on. It is important to

leave enough time to get through all of the material in the allotted time. If allowed, some participants could spend the entire session trading "war stories". The overall goal is to encourage and challenge Arrowmen to improve themselves and the performance of the ceremonies in their lodge.

The general information is structured the same for each principal and then incorporates a character specific module for each different session. As the bedrock ceremony for development of the principals, the pre-Ordeal monologues are best suited to incorporate into the discussion and practical performance portion. However, it may be appropriate to utilize the Ordeal ceremony especially for Meteu and the telling of the legend. Participants should also be encouraged to utilize the skills learned during the session in their future performance of any of the ceremonies.

Before teaching the session, become familiar with the narrative. Instructors are encouraged to put the ideas into your own words and add in your thoughts that go along with the concept being explained. In order to better connect with the audience, introduce yourself and your ceremonies resume so that the participants become active listeners early in the presentation. In addition, by weaving in a few appropriate personal anecdotes, the trainer can connect with their audience rather than just reading the narrative verbatim.

Trainers should keep the discussion moving along in order to prevent the lecture portion from getting too long, but be sure not to rush either. There is a lot of information included and should not be overlooked. One caveat to remember is that there will be participants at different levels of ceremonies experience in the session. Instructors need to make the session informative and interesting for the entire audience.

The narrative has been separated into sections headed by a ceremonial quote that can be related to the main idea. Some of the concepts presented contain more information and as such, cover multiple slides. Instructors will want to move the discussion through the bullet points of those slides so that the participants can take notes if they wish. It is also recommended to try to complete the discussion of each heading's focus area before moving onto the next section in order keep the narrative flowing.

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Welcome to Seek the Vision at the 2024 National Order of the Arrow Conference. While this session is designed to cover some of the specific traits personified by Allowat Sakima, much of the general information is applicable to any principal a ceremonialist personifies. It is not designed to teach you the one quintessential way of becoming Allowat Sakima, since that does not exist. As an instructor, it is my goal to provide you with some techniques and ideas which will help each of you develop your own interpretation of the principal. Once you reach that level of truly embodying the principal, you will be delivering a powerful portrayal that inspires candidates and furthers the aims and purpose of the OA. Without the induction process, and specifically the ceremonies we conduct, there would be no future Arrowmen. Moreover, there would be no future for the OA. This is why what you do in the ring is so vital and why ceremonies are so important. This course will give you some tools to help unlock your own creativity and send you on your way to finding <u>Your</u> Allowat Sakima. Please listen with an open mind. You may hear things in my presentation that are new, foreign to you or that you simply don't agree with. There will also be opportunities for you to contribute to the discussion throughout the presentation. In either case, I encourage you to listen and take time to evaluate later. Remember that by listening we can make the right decisions and we can learn something new every day.

The course is divided into two portions. During this first part we are going to cover some important concepts and hopefully get you thinking about ceremonies in a different way. I encourage you to take notes and ask questions. However, we will try and move quickly through this first portion so we can get to the more "hands-on" part of the course. The second portion is where we learn how to put the theories and ideas from the first portion into practice. Many of you will get an opportunity to come up and work on a portion of Allowat Sakima's part in the pre-Ordeal Ceremony. We will invite some feedback, but it won't be an instruction, but rather suggestions on how you can improve your ceremonies. Even if you have never stepped foot in the ring in front of candidates, I invite you to

consider participating in that portion of the session. By doing so you'll hopefully be better prepared for when you do take your place in the circle.

Serving as a principal is not only service to the lodge, but an integral part of the induction process. Ceremonialists are leaders of the lodge, just like any member of the lodge executive committee. We are here to help you on as far as one can guide another, and it does not stop when you step outside the circle. Without a good ceremonies program, we cannot induct new members or retain active membership in the OA.

If you are simply memorizing the lines and delivering them the same way every time, you are simply doing the bare minimum. By becoming a ceremonialist, you have accepted the responsibility of developing your portrayal through an ongoing process. By trying to improve and get the message across in a clearer, more inspiring way we improve the overall experience for the candidates. This is done through preparation and repetition. The ceremony was purposefully written with few directions, only telling you where to stand at what time. The rest is left up to the individual ceremonialist and the ceremonies team to develop their own version. It is open to some interpretation, so outside of the directions given in the text, there is not one right or wrong way to portray a ceremony.

"Our purpose and intent"

Consider the purpose of the Ordeal ceremonies. Through the ceremonies process, we not only bring new members into the OA, but we also disseminate the message of Brotherhood, Cheerfulness, Service and reinforce the points of the Scout Oath and Law. The qualities in the character of the candidates lead them to the circle where they should be inspired to explore as they participate in ceremonies. The deeper purpose is to build better leaders through service to others in their unit and the community.

The four principals represent the first exposure of the Order of the Arrow to new members. Therefore, as leaders of the lodge, ceremonialists <u>must</u> make a positive impression on the candidates to assist them

in their own journey of becoming better leaders. Ceremonialists not only introduce the ideals of the OA, but are integral in retaining new brothers by guiding them until they complete their induction by attaining Brotherhood membership.

"By inspiration lead them"

When you drill down on their purpose, you understand that the four principals serve as teachers, presenting a new outlook on life. As ceremonialists, it is important for you to convey this deeper meaning and understanding to the candidates. The Ordeal is a journey rich with meaning, but without the ceremonies the candidates can never discover that deeper meaning. Allowat Sakima, Meteu, Nutiket, and Kichkinet, are there to explain and reinforce our core ideals to the candidates and by doing so, give them the keys to unlock its mysteries.

"By inspiration lead them"

In our life experience we develop interests that we are passionate about. You must have that same passion for whatever you choose to do in life. Think about teachers you have had in school. The best teachers were the ones that were passionate about what they were teaching and believed in the importance of the knowledge they were sharing with you. You cannot inspire others on their journey if you are not passionate about Brotherhood, Cheerfulness and Service. Consider why you chose to be involved in ceremonies to help find your own passion for the principal you personify.

"These high places are within you"

As a ceremonialist you must make ceremonies a meaningful part of the Ordeal. First comes an understanding of the message. We then must relate that understanding to the experience to create the wisdom of the ceremony. To make ceremonies meaningful, the ceremonialists must have both understanding, and experience. Experience without understanding is meaningless, and understanding that is never used is pointless.

Taking the first step

First things first, you must become the principal. You goal should be to ultimately erase any separation between yourself and the principal in order to personify that principal. You must be disciplined and put effort into the role. Stop thinking as yourself and start thinking as the principal. That is how you erase

the separation. That is how you become them. This will make the difference between someone who does ceremonies and a great ceremonialist.

Before you read any word of dialogue in the Ceremony for the Ordeal text, you will see instructions for the investing process. Investing serves a purpose and is done for the benefit of the ceremonialists. The process assists the team in making the transition from themselves into the principal they will become. Investiture is essential for achieving the goal of inducting the candidates. Once you have embodied the principal you can you teach the candidates about the Order through the spirit of the character.

Utilize the investing process to clear your mind and make their purpose your purpose, their thoughts your thoughts. To gain understanding, we must listen carefully to what each principal is saying. To do this, take a moment and put yourself in the principal's mind. Ask yourself, what is their purpose? What challenges do they present to the candidates? What tokens do they bear? What emotions do they display? What character changes take place?

For most ceremonialists, the process of becoming a principal can be very difficult. Ceremonialists must discovery ways to assist in their portrayal. One of the most important things a ceremonialist must do before they can become the principal is to learn more about what motivates them. With each of the four principals there is no disconnect between their thoughts, words, and actions. This makes your job as a ceremonialist easier. To portray them, consider what they say and do. By breaking down each principal's part, you gain insight into your portrayal.

Breakout Activity

Breakout Activity

Materials Needed: Paper for the group to write down ideas during discussion. Length of Activity: 5 Minutes.

Activity Description: Participants should discuss the principal, using the slide questions as a starting point. The training should assist in breaking them into groups of 4-8 depending on class size. The trainer should ask each group for at least one response for each question before moving onto the next slide.

What is Allowat Sakima's purpose? What does Allowat Sakima represent? What is Allowat Sakima's challenge? What token do they present?

What is Allowat Sakima's purpose? When the candidates first encounter Allowat, all they learn is that Allowat is the chieftain. Allowat is referred to in the Ordeal ceremony as the "Mighty Chief". Allowat therefore is the embodiment of leadership in the circle. What does Allowat Sakima represent? Allowat represents service. What is Allowat Sakima's Challenge? Allowat Sakima challenges us with arduous labor and instructs us to work gladly during our Ordeal. What token does Allowat Sakima present? Allowat Sakima carries a quiver of arrows and tells the candidates as they draw an arrow that like the arrow, "you were drawn from many others". The members of their unit recognized the candidates as "Servant Leaders" during their unit election.

The chosen arrow represents the candidate elected by their unit. The drawing of the arrow is a foreshadowing of the sign of the Ordeal that they will receive during their Ordeal ceremony. In essence, Allowat is already hailing the candidates as Arrowman. Allowat demonstrates service by connecting brotherhood and cheerfulness in the service of the physical act of stringing the bow. Service is later represented by the left hand on the left shoulder as I sign that the candidates will return in service to their troop.

The candidates are asked, "Who will go upon this journey." The candidates are given a choice rather than forced to complete the Ordeal. Therefore, because they must consent, they are given the opportunity to withdraw once advised of the challenges they will face. It has to be a voluntary journey of

one's self. The candidate's step forward is not just a physical step of accepting Allowat's challenge, but it also symbolically represents the first step inward to self-understanding. When they test the bow, they provide further consent of their willingness to make that journey.

Allowat Sakima exhibits character changes while speaking. Allowat Sakima begins by reviewing what Nutiket and Meteu have said and then foreshadowing what Kichkinet will say. Allowat adopts a friendly greeting, welcoming the candidates as friends. Allowat is a motivator for the candidates, providing inspiration to the candidates like a general about to lead troops into battle, or an SPL on a campout. When the candidates are told, "The ones who chose you need you," Allowat is referring to the members of their troop who will need the candidates to return to them in service, and inspire them by setting the example of cheerful service to others.

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The most important time for you individually as a ceremonialist and with your team is not the actual Ordeal. Instead, it is the time in between when you are discovering new ways to connect with the principal. During this preparation time, give yourself the freedom to explore and play with the ceremony.

"You must be prepared completely"

Ceremony meetings and individual preparation are times where you can experiment with new gestures and inflection. Use it as an opportunity to get the opinions and suggestions of your teammates. By working together to dig deeper into the ceremony, your team will bond and the overall performance will improve. It doesn't matter how good you are, there is always room for improvement. An athlete or musician must practice to get better at their craft, so too must you spend time practicing the performance of the ceremony.

It is easier to learn something correctly the first time rather than unlearn a bad habit. A good ceremonialist should always come prepared to rehearsal depending on what your chairman, advisor or

coach tells you to prepare for. Always keep an open mind and be prepared with new ideas and perspectives. Most importantly, the Ordeal is not the time to try new gestures or inflection!

You will perform the ceremony how you first memorized it. Do not break up thoughts -"Hi...how...Are you...Doing?" If you deliver the lines this way, candidates may understand what was said, but meaning may be lost on them. A ceremonialist performs this way because they memorized the lines as they were written out in the ceremonies text.

When we have conversations, we don't naturally speak in a choppy way. A memorized portrayal should not sound like you are reading lines out of a book. A very useful exercise is to write the ceremony out in prose and then write it out in your own words. This will force you to be clear on what the principal is saying. Recite the lines in formal sentences that have a natural flow to them. Part of connecting with the candidates is speaking in a natural rhythm.

Know your audience. Once you've put in the work of truly understanding what you are saying, the next step is to make it easy for the candidates to understand it. That is where it is important that you connect with them. How can we effectively connect with the candidates? First, it is important to make eye contact and talk to them, not at them. We communicate a lot with our eyes. Sometimes you can say more with a look than with words. Don't just focus on a couple of candidates; try to connect with as many as possible by looking them over.

Put yourself in their shoes. We were all once candidates ourselves, so remember there is a lot going on in the lead up and during the pre-Ordeal. If you are truly sincere in your performance, the candidates will see that in your eyes. It goes beyond just eye contact and must really be a spiritual connection with them. This type of strong connection with the listeners is not always easy, but once mastered will benefit you in your own experiences and personal interactions throughout your life.

Another important technique you must develop as a ceremonialist is finding your voice. You must project your voice. You must develop a strong voice, but don't yell at the candidates! The message you

are trying to convey will not get across if the candidates can't hear what you are saying. Great singers use their diaphragm to project their voice, so do great public speakers.

Be sure to enunciate all the vowels in a word and avoid swallowing words. To facilitate this, open your mouth wide and be careful not to block your face with your gestures. Just as with eye contact, you must project your voice to all the candidates as a group and be sure that you are projecting your voice in all directions, so that the furthest candidate away can hear you.

A good exercise is to imagine that you are throwing a ball to your friend, project your voice and say, "Catch the ball." Finding your own voice has a second meaning that refers to your delivery of the ceremony. Make your performance <u>YOUR</u> own interpretation of the principal, not an impersonation of someone else's.

There's no clock on this thing. You should enjoy and appreciate the ceremony when performing, don't rush! It is rare that someone will be critiqued on delivering lines too slowly. As long as your delivery is flowing, don't be afraid to take your time. Pauses can be your friend, they help you add emphasis by making your words sink in and help your overall delivery of the ceremony.

Pauses can also be effective when making character changes. A deliberate pause can key the audience into an important part of your portrayal. If you have a brain flub or get lost in your delivery, don't be afraid to pause and collect your thoughts.

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Body language is a large part of our communication with the candidates. Your body is always telling a story, so utilize that in your portrayal. You should walk with purpose that is apparent to the audience. Every movement made in the ring should have meaning. A grounded body communicates confidence and power and helps the listener pay attention.

However, while you carry yourself with confidence, avoid becoming a statue. Don't be afraid to move around the ring in your portrayal of the principal. Movement is another method to effect a character change. A principal might change position when transitioning into a different character within the same monologue. Think of Meteu's change into the Great and Mighty Chieftain or Nutiket's change into a generic scout.

Move with a meaning and purpose that will be apparent to the candidate. If you choose to move around during the ceremony, make sure that you are moving with purpose and not simply wandering. Be sure to look at and pay attention to the other principals when they are speaking! If you're not paying attention then why should the candidates? In addition, often our bodies will begin to shift or sway while we are speaking. Try to avoid swaying or shifting around in place especially when other principals are speaking.

This distracts our audience and takes the energy away from what we are saying and makes it lose its focus. Most of the time we aren't even aware that we are doing it. During ceremony meetings, your teammates and advisers can point those actions out to you. Another technique is to perform in front of a mirror or make a video of yourself. Then, it just becomes a matter of being conscious of it for a while. If you work on these issues, they will eventually disappear.

"I don't know what to do with my hands", is a common lamentation, especially by new ceremonialists. Figuring out what to do with our hands is often one of the hardest things to do. Consider gestures as an opportunity to make <u>Your</u> portrayal of the ceremony unique. Gestures help us convey the message through visual representation. The use of gestures should be personal to each ceremonialist. Therefore, the actual gesture you use and the amount you use them is a very personal decision.

You can initially use gestures that others have used as a foundation to build upon as you develop and incorporate your own. Gestures should be big so that all the candidates can see them and you want to avoid boxing yourself in. Do not stand with your arms crossed or used closed fists. It is okay to repeat gestures or try variations of the same movement such as when pointing to your sash for example using a one-handed vs. a two-handed movement.

Make sure your gestures flow naturally and feel comfortable to you. Your gestures should aid in conveying meaning and understanding of the ceremony, rather than just waving your hands. If a gesture doesn't aid in understanding, it may be unnecessary. If your gestures feel forced, or appear uncomfortable, they probably look unnatural to the candidates too.

Don't just, "phone it in". If your heart is not in the portrayal of a principal, the candidates have no reason to be invested in the ceremony either. Obviously, you can't effectively portray a principal in the ceremony if you don't know the lines, but anyone can just memorize the words and regurgitate them back. Utilize gestures, inflection, and changes in volume to emphasize meaning.

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Remember that facial expressions are also non-verbal cues that add meaning. Gestures and inflection should help the candidates gain understanding of the meaning of the ceremony. Your gestures, inflection and movements during the ceremony should be natural, and compliment your portrayal, never detract from it.

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"The show must go on". Stage fright is natural, so reassure yourself that you prepared, and practiced as much as you could in rehearsal. Even the most experienced actor or ceremonialist can get nervous before a performance. Take a deep breath before you perform and be confident. If you forget a line it is never going to be as bad as you can imagine. We are often our own worst critics. Channel your nerves and fear into increased focus on your portrayal.

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If you dwell on a mistake you will inevitably make more mistakes. When a musician misses a note, they continue their performance so that the audience doesn't catch on. Remember that the candidates have

never heard the ceremony before. You should utilize the 5 P's: Proper Preparation Prevents Poor Performance! The only cure is to prepare beforehand and use your practice time wisely.

Above all make sure you are having fun! Ceremonies should be something you enjoy with your fellow brothers on your team. Think about strengthening your ties of brotherhood by spending time together outside the ring. As a team, you can plan non-ceremonial events and just go out to have fun. This will help you bond and will develop how you function as a team. Perhaps you can have a meeting where you focus more on meaning and symbolism rather than individual portrayal.

You can also do fun exercises such as trying an improvisational version of the ceremony while still delivering the same message. In other words, try telling the story without using the text. You can also try breaking the ice at meetings to ease the nerves of aspiring ceremonialists by performing the ceremony as different characters just for fun. "Now Performing: Darth Allowat?" While it may seem like a silly exercise, it can be a helpful tool even for an experienced ceremonialist to break out of a habitual way of their portrayal in the ceremony, and open us to new ideas. Just please don't perform as a character in an actual ceremony!

Section Five – Practical Application

At this point the trainer needs to ask for volunteers to demonstrate their portrayal of the principal. Have a copy or two of the ceremonial text and encourage those that may never have done it before to try it our. This is a learning exercise not a formal evaluation. Keep it limited to a paragraph or small portion they want to work on from the pre-Ordeal ceremony. In the Meteu session, it is okay if they want to use a portion of the legend. After the volunteer is finished, take a moment to provide and elicit feedback from the group. Keep it positive, brief and moving forwards onto the next wolunteer.

Conclusion & Takeaway Challenge

5 Minutes

At the end of this portion, make sure to thank all of the Arrowmen who participated and give a final word of encouragement to all attendants to continue to dig deeper and find new ways to connect to the candidates.

During ceremony team meetings, you will get feedback from teammates and advisers. In competitions and evaluations, you will get feedback from evaluators. However, anyone can judge a ceremony so don't be afraid to accept critique from a broad range of Arrowmen. Remember who your key audience is during the ceremony. You must remember that the ceremony is for the candidates who have not seen or read the ceremony. Often, a neutral evaluator will observe something in a portrayal that an advisor, coach or fellow team member missed. Always keep an open mind and be open to feedback. Accept feedback for the gift it is. If you disagree with the criticism you may disregard it, but it never hurts to try something new. Before you get defensive, consider if you have a rational basis for an aspect of your portrayal. If so, then it may be very effective. However, if a portion of your portrayal requires an in-depth explanation, it's probably lost on the candidates. Be ever mindful that there is no one perfect way to portray a principal in a ceremony. The words, "But we've always done it that way." Should be eliminated from your vocabulary. Try to avoid getting locked into one track of belief and understanding. Critique focuses on areas where you can improve. Criticism should be constructive and a good ceremonialist should be able to accept criticism and want to improve. In giving and receiving criticism be mindful of the admonition. These tools, like the ceremonies themselves, are not merely limited to helping the individual gain a better understanding of the Ordeal. Take this experience back to the Lodge and now that you have this "Higher Vision", help your brothers understand.
