- <u>Values:</u> The mission of Scouting America is to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Law.
- <u>Aims and Methods</u>: The Scouting program has specific objectives, commonly referred to as the "Aims of Scouting." They are character development, leadership development, citizenship training, and personal fitness. Leadership development is also one of Scouting's eight methods contributing to both good character and good citizenship.

 - \circ "Teach Scouts not how to get a living, but how to live." BP
 - "There's no teaching to compare with example." BP
 - Discussion
